# **IR Receiver Modules for Remote Control Systems**

### Description


The TSOP85#.. - series are two lens miniaturized receiver modules for infrared remote control systems. One PIN diode per lens and a preamplifier are assembled on a PCB, the epoxy lens cap is designed as an IR filter.

The demodulated output signal can be directly decoded by a microprocessor. The TSOP852.. is compatible with all common IR remote control data formats. The TSOP854.. is optimized to suppress almost all spurious pulses from energy saving fluorescent lamps but will also suppress some data signals.

This component has not been qualified according to automotive specifications.

Control Circuit


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Block Diagram




Figure 2. Pulse Length and Sensitivity in Dark Ambient





Figure 3. Output Function






Figure 5. Frequency Dependence of Responsivity




Figure 6. Sensitivity in Bright Ambient








Figure 7. Sensitivity vs. Supply Voltage Disturbances




Figure 8. Sensitivity vs. Electric Field Disturbances




Figure 9. Max. Envelope Duty Cycle vs. Burst Length




Figure 10. Sensitivity vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 11. Relative Spectral Sensitivity vs. Wavelength




Figure 12. Directivity

#### **Suitable Data Format**

The TSOP85#.. series is designed to suppress spurious output pulses due to noise or disturbance signals. Data and disturbance signals can be distinguished by the devices according to carrier frequency, burst length and envelope duty cycle. The data signal should be close to the band-pass center frequency (e.g. 38 kHz) and fulfill the conditions in the table below.

When a data signal is applied to the TSOP85#.. in the presence of a disturbance signal, the sensitivity of the receiver is reduced to insure that no spurious pulses are present at the output. Some examples of disturbance signals which are suppressed are:

- DC light (e.g. from tungsten bulb or sunlight)
- · Continuous signals at any frequency




Figure 14. IR Signal from Fluorescent Lamp with High Modulation




Figure 13. IR Signal from Fluorescent Lamp with Low Modulation

- Strongly or weakly modulated noise from fluorescent lamps with electronic ballasts (see figure 13 or figure 14).








### Package Dimensions in millimeters



## **Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement**

It is the policy of Vishay Semiconductor GmbH to

- 1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.
- 2. Regularly and continuously improve the performance of our products, processes, distribution and operating systems with respect to their impact on the health and safety of our employees and the public, as well as their impact on the environment.

It is particular concern to control or eliminate releases of those substances into the atmosphere which are known as ozone depleting substances (ODSs).

The Montreal Protocol (1987) and its London Amendments (1990) intend to severely restrict the use of ODSs and forbid their use within the next ten years. Various national and international initiatives are pressing for an earlier ban on these substances.

Vishay Semiconductor GmbH has been able to use its policy of continuous improvements to eliminate the use of ODSs listed in the following documents.

- 1. Annex A, B and list of transitional substances of the Montreal Protocol and the London Amendments respectively.
- 2. Class I and II ozone depleting substances in the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in the USA.
- 3. Council Decision 88/540/EEC and 91/690/EEC Annex A, B and C (transitional substances) respectively.

Vishay Semiconductor GmbH can certify that our semiconductors are not manufactured with ozone depleting substances and do not contain such substances.

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
