TEMT4700 is a high speed silicon NPN epitaxial planar phototransistor in a miniature PLCC-3 package for surface mounting on printed boards. Due to its waterclear epoxy the device is sensitive to visible and near infrared radiation.

A base terminal is available to enable biasing and sensitivity control.




Figure 1. Total Power Dissipation vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 2. Collector Dark Current vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 3. Relative Collector Current vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 4. Collector Light Current vs. Irradiance



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


Figure 5. Collector Light Current vs. Collector Emitter Voltage




Figure 6. Collector Emitter Capacitance vs. Collector Emitter Voltage




Figure 7. Turn On/Turn Off Time vs. Collector Current




Figure 8. Relative Spectral Sensitivity vs. Wavelength





Figure 9. Relative Radiant Sensitivity vs. Angular Displacement

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



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Ozone Depleting Substances Policy Statement

It is the policy of Vishay Semiconductor GmbH to

- 1. Meet all present and future national and international statutory requirements.
- 2. Regularly and continuously improve the performance of our products, processes, distribution and operatingsystems with respect to their impact on the health and safety of our employees and the public, as well as their impact on the environment.

It is particular concern to control or eliminate releases of those substances into the atmosphere which are known as ozone depleting substances (ODSs).

The Montreal Protocol (1987) and its London Amendments (1990) intend to severely restrict the use of ODSs and forbid their use within the next ten years. Various national and international initiatives are pressing for an earlier ban on these substances.

Vishay Semiconductor GmbH has been able to use its policy of continuous improvements to eliminate the use of ODSs listed in the following documents.

- 1. Annex A, B and list of transitional substances of the Montreal Protocol and the London Amendments respectively
- 2. Class I and II ozone depleting substances in the Clean Air Act Amendments of 1990 by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in the USA
- 3. Council Decision 88/540/EEC and 91/690/EEC Annex A, B and C (transitional substances) respectively.

Vishay Semiconductor GmbH can certify that our semiconductors are not manufactured with ozone depleting substances and do not contain such substances.
